#### **Picturing Ourselves** Linda Haverty

Rugg, 2007-12-01. Photography has transformed the way we picture ourselves. Although photographs seem to prove our existence at a given point in time, they also demonstrate the impossibility of framing our multiple and fragmented selves. As Linda Haverty Rugg convincingly shows, photography's double take on self-image mirrors the concerns of autobiographers who see the self as simultaneously divided in observing being and unified by the autobiographical act. Rugg tracks photography's impact on the formation of self-image through the study of four literary autobiographers concerned with the transformative power of photography. Obsessed with self-image, Mark Twain and August Strindberg both attempted unsuccessfully to integrate photographs into their autobiographies. While Twain encouraged photographers, he was wary of fakery and kept a fierce watch on the distribution of his photographic image. Strindberg, believing that photographs had occult power, preferred to photograph himself. Because of their experiences under National Socialism, Walter Benjamin and Christa Wolf feared the dangerously objectifying power of photographs and omitted them from their autobiographical writings. Yet Benjamin used them in his photographic conception of history, which had its testing ground in his often ignored *Berliner Kindheit um 1900*. And Christa Wolf's narrator in *Patterns of Childhood* attempts to reclaim her childhood from the Nazis by reconstructing mental images of lost family photographs. Confronted with multiple and conflicting images of themselves, all four of these writers are torn between the knowledge that texts, photographs, and indeed selves are haunted by undecidability and the desire for the returned glance of a single self.

#### **The Discourse of Italian Cinema and Beyond**

Roberta Piazza, 2010-12-16. Roberta Piazza's book is a linguistic investigation of the dialogue of Italian cinema covering a selection of films from the 1950s to the present day. It looks at how speech is dealt with in studies of the cinema and tackles the lack of engagement with dialogue in film studies. It explores the representation of discourse in cinema, the way particular manifestations of verbal interaction are reproduced in film. Whereas representation generally refers to the language used in texts to assign meaning to a group and its social practices, here discourse representation more directly refers to the

relationship between real life and cinematic discourse Piazza analyses how fictional dialogue reinterprets authentic interaction in order to construe particular meanings Beginning by exploring the relationship between discourse and genre the second half of the book takes a topic based approach and reflects on the themes of narrative and identity The analysis carried out takes on board the multi semiotic and multimodal components of film discourse The book uses also uses concepts and methodologies from pragmatics conversation analysis and discourse analysis

neither medium takes precedence Or are they in constant inexorable battle with each other Taking nine case studies from the 1990s French speaking world from France North Africa and the Caribbean this book attempts to define the interaction between non fictional written text caption essay fragment poem and photographic image Having considered three categories of intermediality between text and photography the collaborative the self collaborative and the retrospective the book concludes that the dimensions of their interaction are not simple and two fold visibility versus alongside textuality but threefold and therefore complex Thus the photo text as defined here is concerned as much with orality the demotic the popular the vernacular as it is with visual and written culture That text image collaborations give space to the spoken spectral traces of human discourse suggests that the key element of the photo text is its radical provisionality **Basic**

The mighty Hoover Dam starting as a dream of land developers and farmers became the most ambitious civil engineering project of the Great Depression This landmark in the middle of the Mojave Desert holding back the largest man made lake in America also became like Mount Rushmore or the Empire State Building a visual and cultural icon The power and meanings of this icon came not through a single image but via myriad visual representations in government propaganda advertising journalism and art Even before it was built these images were used to shape the public's perception of the project and frame the dam as the linchpin to an expanding American economic empire in the desert Southwest Anthony F Arrigo has researched a wide array of primary sources and archival materials to trace the project from its earliest representations in illustrations to the documentary photography of its construction and later depictions of the structure in commercial promotions fine art photography and paintings Analyzing Hoover Dam through the trajectory of imagery across several decades rather than the narrative of its construction illuminates the underlying cultural and ecological imperatives in the drive to build it including the influence of religious doctrine and the American agrarian movement Arrigo also discusses various portrayals of laborers women minority groups nature and technology in this imagery In time the visual icon of power and domination was commercialized to sell cars vacations and more Imaging Hoover Dam is an important work in both visual rhetoric and cultural studies It will also intrigue readers interested in such varied topics as the history of the American Southwest the Great Depression and the New Deal social and environmental issues and American popular culture

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
