Nolen, 2021-10-21 Symbolic of the historic conflict between North and South has been the South's attitude toward African Americans This historical study presents a thorough analysis derived from books periodicals speeches sermons lectures and other documents of the doctrine of white supremacy      *Southern Writers in the Modern World* Donald Davidson, 2010-11-01 One of the most important of the Southern magazines in the 1920s was *The Fugitive* a magazine of verse and brief commentaries on literature in general Among its contributors were John Crowe Ransom Allen Tate Robert Penn Warren Donald Davidson and Merrill Moore Publication began in April 1922 and ended in December 1925 Soon thereafter the *Fugitive* writers and some others became profoundly concerned with the materialism of American life and its effect upon the South The group became known as Agrarians Their thinking and discussion culminated in a symposium *I'll Take My Stand* published in 1930 In his first two lectures Davidson describes the underlying nature and aims of the *Fugitive* and Agrarian movements He brings to the discussion his intimate and thorough knowledge of Southern life and letters The third lecture deals with the place of the writer in the modern university posing the questions of whether the writer needs the university and whether the university needs or wants the writer      **Images of the South** Center for Southern Folklore, Eudora Welty, 1977      Contemporary Southern Men Fiction Writers Rosemary M. Hugh Holman, 2008 At the heart of the southern riddle you will find a union of opposites a condition of instability a paradox Calm grace and raw hatred Polished manners and violence An intense individualism and intense group pressures toward conformity A reverence to the point of idolatry of self determining action and a caste and class structure presupposing an aristocratic hierarchy A passion for political action and a willingness to surrender to the enslavement of demagogues A love of the nation intense enough to

make the South's fighting men notorious in our wars and the advocacy of interposition and of the public defiance of national law. A region breeding both Thomas Jefferson and John C. Calhoun. If these contradictions are to be brought in focus if these ambiguities are to be resolved it must be through the reconciliation of opposites. And the reconciliation of opposites as Coleridge has told us is the function of the poet. So begins the first of these seventeen penetrating essays drawn from long and fruitful reflection of southern life and art by C. Hugh Holman. Professor Holman maintains that there is a congeries of characteristics identifiably present in much southern writing and he astutely defines them in this collection. William Gilmore Simms, Ellen Glasgow, Thomas Wolfe, William Faulkner and Flannery O'Connor are treated at length. Among the other authors considered in terms of their roles in the making of the southern mind are James Branch Cabell, T. S. Stribling, Erskine Caldwell and Robert Penn Warren. The essays strike a fine balance between general overview and specific analysis and they are so arranged as to make a unified study which forms a significant chapter in the intellectual history of the South. Professor Holman asserts that out of the cauldron of the South's experience the southern writer has fashioned tragic grandeur and given it as a gift to his fellow Americans. It is possible that no other southern accomplishment will equal it in enduring importance. As urbanization and industrialism conspire to write an epitaph for Dixie its greatest contribution to mankind may well be the lesson of its history and the drama of its suffering. In these superb essays the author makes a convincing argument for that position.

**Southern Writers at Century's End** Jeffrey J. Folks, James A. Perkins, 2021-12-14. Since the end of World War II the South has experienced a greater awareness of growth and of its accompanying tensions than other regions of the United States. The rapid change that climaxed with the war in Vietnam, the Cold War, civil rights demonstrations and Watergate has forced the traditional South to come to terms with social upheaval. As the essays collected in *Southern Writers at Century's End* point out, southern writing since 1975 reflects the confusion and violence that have characterized late twentieth century public culture. These essays consider the work of twenty-one of the foremost southern writers whose most important fiction has appeared in the last quarter of this century. **Southern Writers Bear Witness** Jan Nordby Gretlund, 2018-07-15. Fourteen Southern storytellers reveal their influences, methods and daily routines and struggles with the writing process. Jan Nordby Gretlund has been studying the literature of the American South for some fifty years and his outsider's perspective as a European scholar has made him an intellectually acute witness of both the literature and its creators. Whether it is their language and reflexive

**Sites of Southern Memory** Darlene O'Dell, 2001 In southern graveyards through the first decades of the twentieth century the Confederate South was commemorated by tombstones and memorials in Confederate flags and in Memorial Day speeches and burial rituals Cemeteries spoke the language of southern memory and identity was displayed in ritualistic form inscribed

on tombs in texts and in bodily memories and messages Katharine DuPre Lumpkin Lillian Smith and Pauli Murray wove sites of regional memory particularly Confederate burial sites into their autobiographies as a way of emphasizing how segregation divided more than just southern landscapes and people Darlene O Dell here considers the southern graveyard as one of three sites of memory the other two being the southern body and southern memoir upon which the region's catastrophic race relations are inscribed O Dell shows how Lumpkin Smith and Murray all witnesses to commemorations of the Confederacy and efforts to maintain the social order of the New South contended through their autobiographies against Lost Cause versions of southern identity Sites of Southern Memory elucidates the ways in which these three writers joined in the dialogue on regional memory by placing the dead southern body as a site of memory within their texts In this unique study of three women whose literary and personal lives were vitally concerned with southern race relations and the struggle for social justice O Dell provides a telling portrait of the troubled intellectual literary cultural and social history of the American South

**The Intellectual in Twentieth-Century Southern Literature** Tara Powell, 2012-01-09 Never in its long history has the South provided an entirely comfortable home for the intellectual In this thought provoking contribution to the field of southern studies Tara Powell considers the evolving ways that major post World War II southern writers have portrayed intellectuals from Flannery O'Connor's ironic view of interlockchuls to Gail Godwin's southerners striving to feel at home in the academic world Although Walker Percy like his fellow Catholic writer O'Connor explicitly rejected the intellectual label for himself he nonetheless introduced the modern novel of ideas to southern letters Powell shows by placing sympathetic non-caricatured intellectuals at the center of his influential works North Carolinians Doris Betts and her student Tim McLaurin made their living teaching literature and creative writing in academia and Betts's fiction often includes dislocated academics while McLaurin's superb memoirs often funny frequently point up the limitations of the mind as opposed to the heart and the spirit Examining works by Ernest Gaines Alice Walker and Randall Kenan Powell traces the evolution of the black American literacy narrative from a stress on the post Emancipation conviction which saw formal education as an essential means of resisting oppression to the growing suspicion in the post civil rights era of literacy acts that may estrange educated blacks from the larger black community Powell concludes with Godwin who embraces university life in her fiction as she explores what it means to be a southern female intellectual in the modern world a world in which all those markers inscribe isolation

Capitani, 2009-01-01 *Truthful Pictures* examines novels and sermons written in the antebellum South in particular those written after the 1851 publication of *Uncle Tom's Cabin* It begins with a historical overview of the function of women writers in American literature in order to help locate sentimental fiction within its historical context by analyzing the works of Southern female authors such as Caroline Hentz and Mary H Eastman Though they followed in Harriet Beecher Stowe's footsteps authors like Hentz and Eastman used their voices in conjunction with Christian ideology to support slavery The text then explores how Holy Scripture was perverted in Southern sermons by pulpit leaders such as Thornton Stringfellow and Alexander McCaine in order to allow the continued enslavement of one group by another using religion to defend white patriarchy as the normal human way of life By examining antebellum sermons and writings and their influence on sentimental novels *Truthful Pictures* shows how religious texts reinforced political ideologies in the wake of increasing racial



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
