Image Worlds David E. Nye, 1985 By viewing the corporation as a communicator *Image Worlds* links the histories of labor business consumption engineering and photography providing a new perspective on one of the largest and most representative corporations General Electric was one of the first modern industrial corporations to use photographs and other media resources to create images of itself and the GE archives comprising well over a million images form one of the largest privately held collections in the world To produce this venturesome book David Nye has used these vast archives to develop a new approach to corporate ideology through corporate iconography *Image Worlds* embraces symbols intentional signs and photographs on the one hand and the history of institutional and technological development on the other It views photography as a developing technology with a history of its own and presents the corporation as a communicator as well as a producer and employer Illustrated with nearly 60 photographs from the archives the book identifies five image markets that GE sought to organize and address Company engineers workers and managers received publications designed to appeal to their presumed interests Some of these grew into public journals with a scientific educational mission others were restricted in circulation even within the company At the same time illustrated mass media advertising was created to reach potential consumers of GE products Advertising that presented an image of GE as a place where progress was the most important product While GE was promoting this enlightened image the company was also using its resources to reach the voting public hoping to gain their support for private electrification in the national debate over municipal power David E Nye is Associate Professor of American History at Odense University in Denmark

World of Image in Islamic Philosophy van Lit L. W. The Ghosts of Justice Ashok Kara, 2001 It is not possible to read Heidegger s text without the image of his arm raised in the Nazi salute haunting it The image compels us to examine Heidegger s philosophy in terms of its susceptibility to Nazi ideology Heidegger s philosophy was inscribed at the end of the history of philosophy a time when Nazism was on the rise and on its way to the renewal of German destiny In paragraph six of *Being and Time* Heidegger outlined his agenda for the renewal of philosophy The renewal necessitated the destruction of the errant history of ontology in order to retrieve the pure primordial experiences The parallels between the forms of two agendas are coincidental However my work shows where they overlapped I explore the consequence of this overlap by

soliciting the first text of philosophy The Anaximander Fragment that speaks about justice and injustice Justice is also at issue in the text of Jacques Derrida Derrida's primary resource is paragraph six of Heidegger's Being and Time a fact that caused some of his readers to assimilate him to Heidegger Derrida has tried to distance himself from Heidegger and in a late text he has offered us the prescriptive phrase Deconstruction is justice to guide our reading of his text The phrase invites us to examine Derrida's work in light of its saying This is what I try to do I show that a separation cannot be accomplished without a price because whether an author intends it or not justice is something ghostly and it keeps its own account Heidegger's arm and Derrida's hand caught in the trap of paragraph six tell another story different from the stories the authors tell The limbs tell the story about the ghosts of justice

Grammatology of Images Sigrid Weigel, 2022-08-16 Grammatology of Images radically alters how we approach images Instead of asking for the history power or essence of images Sigrid Weigel addresses imaging as such The book considers how something visible gets transformed into an image Weigel scrutinizes the moment of *mise en apparence* of making an appearance and the process of concealment that accompanies any imaging Weigel reinterprets Derrida's and Freud's concept of the trace as that which must be thought before something exists In doing so she illuminates the threshold between traces and iconic images between something immaterial and its pictorial representation Chapters alternate between general accounts of the line the index the effigy and the cult image and case studies from the history of science art politics and religion involving faces as indicators of emotion caricatures as effigies of defamation and angels as embodiments of transcendental ideas Weigel's approach to images illuminates fascinating unexpected correspondences between premodern and contemporary image practices between the history of religion and the modern sciences and between things that are and are not understood as art

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
