

Wilson, 2024-04-16 Based on an extensive collection of letters written from the home front and the battlefield *Family War Stories* offers fresh insights into how the reciprocal nature of family correspondence can shape a family's understanding of the war *Family War Stories* examines the contribution of the Densmore family to the Northern Civil War effort It extends the boundaries of research in two directions First by describing how members of this white family from Minnesota were mobilized to fight a family war on the home front and the battlefield and second by exploring how the war challenged the family's abolitionist beliefs and racial attitudes *Family War Stories* argues that the totality of the family's Civil War experience was intricately shaped by the dynamics of family life and the reciprocal nature of family correspondence Further it argues that the serving sons' understanding of the war was shaped by their direct military experiences in the army camps and battlefields and how their loved ones at home interpreted these experiences With two sons serving as officers in the United States Colored Troops regiments fighting in the Mississippi Valley the Densmore family was heavily involved in destroying slavery *Family War Stories* analyses how the sons' military experiences tested the family's abolitionist ideology and its commitment to white racial superiority It also explains how the family sought to accommodate the presence of a refugee from slavery working in the family kitchen In some ways the presence of this worker in the household posed an even greater range of challenges to the family's racial beliefs than the sons' military service By examining one family's deep involvement in the war against slavery Wilson analyses how the Civil War posed particular challenges to Northerners committed to abolitionism and white supremacy On the Edge of Freedom David G. Smith, 2014-12-15 In *On the Edge of Freedom* David G. Smith breaks new ground by illuminating the unique development of antislavery sentiment in south central Pennsylvania a border region of a border state with a complicated

history of slavery antislavery activism and unequal freedom During the antebellum decades every single fugitive slave escaping by land east of the Appalachian Mountains had to pass through the region where they faced both significant opportunities and substantial risks While the hundreds of fugitives traveling through south central Pennsylvania defined as Adams Franklin and Cumberland counties during this period were aided by an effective Underground Railroad they also faced slave catchers and informers Underground work such as helping fugitive slaves appealed to border antislavery activists who shied away from agitating for immediate abolition in a region with social economic and kinship ties to the South And as early antislavery protests met fierce resistance area activists adopted a less confrontational approach employing the more traditional political tools of the petition and legal action Smith traces the victories of antislavery activists in south central Pennsylvania including the achievement of a strong personal liberty law and the aggressive prosecution of kidnappers who seized innocent African Americans as fugitives He also documents how their success provoked Southern retaliation and the passage of a strengthened Fugitive Slave Law in 1850 The Civil War then intensified the debate over fugitive slaves as hundreds of escaping slaves called contrabands sought safety in the area and scores were recaptured by the Confederate army during the Gettysburg campaign On the Edge of Freedom explores in captivating detail the fugitive slave issue through fifty years of sectional conflict war and reconstruction in south central Pennsylvania and provocatively questions what was gained by the activists pragmatic approach of emphasizing fugitive slaves over immediate abolition and full equality Smith argues that after the war social and demographic changes in southern Pennsylvania worked against African Americans achieving equal opportunity and although local literature portrayed this area as a vanguard of the Underground Railroad African Americans still lived on the edge of freedom By the 1920s the Ku Klux Klan was rallying near the Gettysburg battlefield and south central Pennsylvania became in some ways as segregated as the Jim Crow South The fugitive slave issue by reinforcing images of dependency may have actually worked against the achievement of lasting social change

War literature on the strategies employed by the Union and Confederacy in the East offering a more integrated interpretation of military operations that shows how politics public perception geography and logistics shaped the course of military operations in the East For all the literature about Civil War military operations and leadership precious little has been written about strategy particularly in what has become known as the eastern theater Yet it is in this theater where the interaction of geography and logistics politics and public opinion battlefield and home front and the conduct of military operations and civil military relations can be highlighted in sharp relief With opposing capitals barely 100 miles apart and with the Chesapeake Bay tidewater area offering Union generals the same sorts of opportunities sought by Confederate leaders in the Shenandoah Valley geography shaped military operations in fundamental ways the very rivers that obstructed Union overland advances offered them the chance to outflank Confederate prepared positions If the proximity of the enemy capital proved too tempting to pass up generals on each side were aware that a major mishap could lead to an enemy parade down the streets of their own capital city Presidents politicians and the press peeked over the shoulders of military commanders some of who were not reluctant to engage in their own intrigues as they promoted their own fortunes The Civil War in the East does not rest upon new primary sources or an extensive rummaging through the mountains of material already available Rather it takes a fresh look at military operations and the assumptions that shaped them and offers a more integrated interpretation of military operations that shows how politics public perception geography and logistics shaped the course of military operations in the East The eastern theater was indeed a theater of decision and indecision precisely because people believed that it was important The presence of the capitals raised the stakes of victory and defeat at a time when people viewed war in terms of decisive battles the anticipation of victory followed by disappointment and persistent strategic stalemate characterized the course of events in the East

The Maryland Campaign of September 1862, Volume I Ezra Carman, 2010-05-20 The definitive soldier's eye view of the Battle of Antietam the bloodiest day in American history A veteran of the Battle of Antietam Ezra A. Carman served as a colonel of the 13th New Jersey Infantry After the horrific fighting of September 17, 1862 he recorded in his diary that he was preparing a good map of the Antietam battle and a full account of the action Unbeknownst to the young officer the project would become the most significant work of his life Appointed as the Historical Expert to the Antietam Battlefield Board in 1894 Carman solicited accounts from hundreds of veterans scoured through thousands of letters and maps and assimilated the material into the hundreds of cast iron tablets that still mark the field today Carman also wrote an 1,800 page manuscript on the campaign Although it remained unpublished for more than a century many historians and students of the war consider it to be the best overall treatment of the campaign ever written Dr. Thomas G. Clemens recognized internationally as one of the foremost historians of the Maryland Campaign has spent more than two decades studying Antietam and editing and richly annotating Carman's exhaustively written manuscript The result is *The Maryland Campaign of September 1862* Carman's magisterial account

Shades of Green Ryan W. Keating, 2017-08-08 Drawing on records of about 5 500 soldiers and veterans Shades of Green traces the organization of Irish regiments from the perspective of local communities in Connecticut Illinois and Wisconsin and the relationships between soldiers and the home front Research on the impact of the Civil War on Irish Americans has traditionally fallen into one of two tracks arguing that the Civil War either further alienated Irish immigrants from American society or that military service in defense of the Union offered these men a means of assimilation In this study of Irish American service Ryan W Keating argues that neither paradigm really holds because many Irish Americans during this time already considered themselves to be assimilated members of American society This comprehensive study argues that the local community was often more important to ethnic soldiers than the imagined ethnic community especially in terms of political social and economic relationships An analysis of the Civil War era from this perspective provides a much clearer understanding of immigrant place and identity during the nineteenth century With a focus on three regiments not traditionally studied the author provides a fine grained analysis revealing that ethnic communities like other types of communities are not monolithic on a
