

Itinerary Octavio Paz, 1999 The final legacy of the Nobel Prize winning author of *The Labyrinth of Solitude* *Itinerary* records the evolution of the political ideas of Octavio Paz the great Mexican writer who was awarded the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1990 It is an intellectual autobiography in a sense but also a sentimental and even passionate one In his thoughts Paz realized the past was inseparable from the present And so he tells the story of his journey through time from youth to adulthood It is not a straight line nor is it a circle it is instead a spiral that turns ceaselessly over bringing into view a time seventy years in the past and the actions of today It is the final work by a great thinker and a magnificent writer
