## Day 2: Counting a 2-Digit Number Made From Linking Cubes

I can count linking cubes to tell how many.

### Materials:

- Linking Cubes
- White Boards & Markers
- Peanut Butter Jelly Time Materials
- Day 2 Ticket Out The Door

### Instructional Activity

In this lesson, you are focusing on having your students count a set of linking cubes that you have already built to represent a two digit number.

Start this lesson with a story problem so that your students have a context to think about the cubes you have built. For example, Jackson bought 5 packs of markers that each had 10 markers inside. He also bought three extra markers. How many markers did Jackson buy?

Show your students a set of linking cubes that you have already built to represent this problem with five ten sticks and three extra ones. Ask your students "How do these blocks match the story we just heard? Where are the five packs of markers? Where are the three extra markers? What could we do to find out how many markers there are all together?"

Referencing the previous lesson, ask your students if they could count the 10 sticks to find out how many the 10 sticks represent. After counting, ask your students "What should we do with the three extra markers here? skip it markers here? Don't exaggerate at this point."

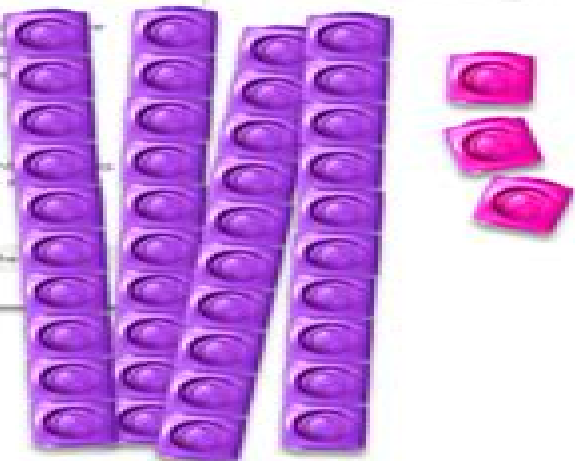
