**Sacajawea's People** John W. W. Mann, 2004-12-01 On October 20 2001 a crowd gathered just east of Salmon Idaho to dedicate the site of the Sacajawea Interpretive Cultural and Education Center in preparation for the Lewis and Clark Bicentennial In a bitter

challenges popular definitions of oral history that have displaced and confined indigenous oral accounts as merely oral tradition.
