**Friedrich Hölderlin** Friedrich Hölderlin, 1797-01-01 Hölderlin's essays and letters constitute essential documents for an understanding of the transitional period from neo classical poetics to what can only be characterized as a unique and in its frequently experimental structure essentially modernist poetics This book contains virtually all of Hölderlin's theoretical writings translated for the first time In spite of the great significance of Hölderlin's ideas for contemporary critical thought most of his highly important theoretical oeuvre has been unavailable to English readers until now Here also are a number of letters which chart the development of Hölderlin's thought on issues that today remain fundamental to poetics and philosophy The work's critical introduction discusses both the historical genesis of Hölderlin's theoretical writings out of the enlightenment as well as their systematic interaction with post Kantian Idealism Through interpretations of three short fragments Pfau indicates that it would be insufficient to consider Hölderlin as the mere precursor of the great systematic philosophers of German Idealism Fichte Schelling and Hegel Instead Hölderlin's earliest theoretical fragments already mark a turn away from the rigorous systematicity that underlies the philosophical discourse of his contemporaries Hölderlin's theoretical writings may be the most seminal texts in the widely discussed interimplication of Idealistic philosophy and Romantic poetry and poetics

Apocalypse of Truth Jean Vioulac, 2021-05-03 We inhabit a time of crisis totalitarianism environmental collapse and the unquestioned rule of neoliberal capitalism Philosopher Jean Vioulac is invested in and worried by all of this but his main concern lies with how these phenomena all represent a crisis within and a threat to thinking itself In his first book to be translated into English Vioulac radicalizes Heidegger's understanding of truth as disclosure through the notion of truth as apocalypse This apocalypse of truth works as an unveiling that reveals both the finitude and mystery of truth allowing a full confrontation with truth as absence Engaging with Heidegger Marx and St Paul as well as contemporary figures including Giorgio Agamben Alain Badiou and Slavoj Žižek Vioulac's book presents a subtle masterful exposition of his analysis before culminating in a powerful vision of the abyss of the deity Here Vioulac articulates a portrait of Christianity as a religion of mourning waiting for a god who has already passed by a form of ever present eschatology whose end has always already taken place With a preface by Jean Luc Marion *Apocalypse of Truth* presents a major contemporary French thinker to English speaking audiences for the first time

*Theory as Practice* Jochen Schulte-Sasse, Haynes Horne, 1997 *Theory as Practice* was first published in 1997 Minnesota Archive Editions uses digital technology to make long unavailable books once again accessible and are published unaltered from the original University of Minnesota Press editions In light of recent dramatic revisions in criticism of European particularly German Romanticism this anthology brings together key texts of the movement especially those written in the last quarter of the eighteenth century by a small influential circle centered at Jena In their introductory essays the editors locate writings by Fichte Schelling Novalis August Wilhelm Schlegel and Friedrich Schlegel among others in this context The selections include extensive excerpts from

Rocca, 2018 Until recently Spinoza's standing in Anglophone studies of philosophy has been relatively low and has only seemed to confirm Friedrich Heinrich Jacobi's assessment of him as a dead dog. However, an exuberant outburst of excellent scholarship on Spinoza has of late come to dominate work on early modern philosophy. This resurgence is due in no small part to the recent revival of metaphysics in contemporary philosophy and to the increased appreciation of Spinoza's role as an unorthodox pivotal figure; indeed, perhaps the pivotal figure in the development of Enlightenment thinking. Spinoza's penetrating articulation of his extreme rationalism makes him a demanding philosopher who offers deep and prescient challenges to all subsequent inevitably less radical approaches to philosophy. While the twenty-six essays in this volume by many of the world's leading Spinoza specialists grapple directly with Spinoza's most important arguments, these essays also seek to identify and explain Spinoza's debts to previous philosophy, his influence on later philosophers, and his significance for contemporary philosophy and for us.

**The Flame of Eternity** Krzysztof Michalski, 2013-12-26 The Flame of Eternity provides a reexamination and new interpretation of Nietzsche's philosophy and the central role that the concepts of eternity and time as he understood them played in it. According to Krzysztof Michalski, Nietzsche's reflections on human life are inextricably linked to time, which in turn cannot be conceived of without eternity. Eternity is a measure of time, but also, Michalski argues, something Nietzsche viewed first and foremost as a physiological concept having to do with the body. The body ages and decays, involving us in a confrontation with our eventual death. It is in relation to this brute fact that we come to understand eternity and the finitude of time. Nietzsche argues that humanity has long regarded the impermanence of our life as an illness in need of curing. It is this pathology that Nietzsche called nihilism. Arguing that this insight lies at the core of Nietzsche's philosophy as a whole, Michalski seeks to explain and reinterpret Nietzsche's thought in light of it. Michalski maintains that many of Nietzsche's main ideas, including his views on love, morality, beyond good and evil, the will to power, overcoming the suprahuman or the overman as it is infamously referred to, the Death of God, and the myth of the eternal return, take on new meaning and significance when viewed through the prism of eternity.



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
