general phonological categories should be required when reading through Part 1 The goal is to provide a broad picture of what lenition is how it behaves which factors it is conditioned by and what generalisations it obeys This record may then be used as a yardstick for competing theories Part 2 presents a number of case studies that show how Lenition Fortition behave in a number of languages that include systems which are notoriously emblematic for Lenition Fortition Celtic Western Romance Germanic and Finnish Finally Part 3 is concerned with the analysis of the patterns that have been described in Parts 1 and 2 Given their analytic orientation Part 3 chapters are theory specific They look at the same empirical record or at a subset thereof and try to explain what they see Even though Part 3 chapters are couched in a specific theoretical environment that most of the time supposes prior conceptual knowledge authors have been asked to assure theoretical interoperability as much as they could
