Irish Murdoch:

Iris Murdoch Antonia Susan Byatt, 1976 Iris Murdoch 1919 1999 was a novelist and philosopher Her first published book was *Sartre Romantic Rationalist* 1953 a study of the French philosopher but she soon turned to fiction Her first novel *Under the Net* 1954 was surprisingly classed with the angry young men movement but her quickly succeeding early novels in particular *The Bell* 1958 soon established her as a novelist of originality and power free of any group associations capable of combining a realistic mode with ready invention fiery imagination and mastery of comic situation In this 1976 study A S Byatt examines Murdoch's fiction and main philosophical ideas relating the two and providing the reader with illuminating insights into the larger dimensions of the novels Her survey which is not chronological groups and interrelates the novels picks out recurrent themes and presents the key ideas in the way likely to be most useful both to the student and to the many readers who read Murdoch with compulsive fascination A volume in the *Writers and Their Work* series which draws upon recent thinking in English studies to introduce writers and their contexts Each volume includes biographical material an examination of recent criticism a bibliography and a reappraisal of a major work by the writer **Iris Murdoch** Anne Rowe, 2019 Iris Murdoch was both a popular and intellectually serious novelist whose writing life spanned the latter half of the twentieth century A proudly Anglo Irish writer who produced twenty six best selling novels she was also a respected philosopher a theological thinker and an outspoken public intellectual This thematically based study outlines the overarching themes that characterise her fiction decade by decade explores her unique role as a British philosopher novelist explains the paradoxical nature of her outspoken atheism and highlights the neglected aesthetic aspect of her fiction which innovatively extended the boundaries of realist fiction While Iris Murdoch is acknowledged here as a writer who vividly evokes the zeitgeist of the late twentieth century she is also presented as a figure whose unconventional life and complex presentation of gender and psychology has immense resonance for twenty first century readers *Iris Murdoch* Peter J. Conradi, 2001 Dame Iris Murdoch has played a major role in English life and letter for nearly half a century As A S Byatt notes she is absolutely central to our culture As a novelist as a thinker and as a private individual her life has significance for our age There is a recognizable Murdoch world and the adjective Murdochian has entered the language to describe situations where a small group of people interact intricately and strangely Her story is as emotionally fascinating as that of Virginia Woolf but far less well known hers has been an adventurous highly eventful life a life of phenomenal emotional and intellectual pressures and her books portray a real world which is if anything toned down as well as mythicised For Iris's formative years documented by Conradi's meticulous research were spent among the leading European and British intellectuals who fought and endured the Second World War From a Tiny Corner in the House of Fiction Gillian Dooley, 2003 Dooley provides background information for each of the interviews along with a thorough index **Degrees of Freedom** A S Byatt, 2018-12-27 First published in 1965 A S Byatt's *Degrees of Freedom* examined the first eight novels of Iris Murdoch identifying freedom as a

central theme in all of them and looking at Murdoch's interest in the relations between art and goodness master and slave and the novel of character in the nineteenth century sense Drawing on Iris Murdoch's own critical and philosophical writing A S Byatt discussed her interest in the thought of Sartre Plato Freud and Simone Weil and related this to the form of the novels themselves This edition of *Degrees of Freedom* has an added dossier of later essays and reviews of Iris Murdoch's work by A S Byatt taking us up to the publication of *The Book and the Brotherhood* in 1987 It also includes a substantial pamphlet written for the British Council which follows Murdoch's fiction as far as *The Good Apprentice* *Iris Murdoch* Donna Lorine Gerstenberger, 1974 *Iris Murdoch* Hilda D. Spear, 2006-10-23 Iris Murdoch produced twenty six novels in forty years The last of these Jackson's Dilemma was published in 1995 four years before her death Murdoch's interest in moral problems inclined her towards what could be seen as an unusual view of human character and human life leading her to create bizarre situations and offer unsettling solutions which frequently challenge and intrigue the reader This essential introduction to one of Britain's best known writers guides the reader through the full range of Murdoch's fictional output tracing basic patterns which run throughout Murdoch's work and showing how the novels help to elucidate one another The revised updated and expanded new edition takes into account certain details which have emerged following Murdoch's death in 1999 incorporates the latest scholarship and offers fuller treatment of a number of novels The second edition also gives more weight to the development of the moral discourse which is predominant in Murdoch's work From the mid sixties onwards Murdoch was intensely concerned with the problems of Good and Evil in a godless world In the later novels particularly those of the eighties and nineties she posited the possibility of mystic personalities who influence others from a position beyond the normal parameters of our world Hilda D.
