Humour in Old English Literature Jonathan Wilcox,2023-10-02 Humour in Old English Literature deploys modern theories of humour to explore the style and content of surviving writing from early medieval England The book analyses Old English riddles wisdom literature runic writing the deployment of rhymes and humour in heroic poetry hagiography and romance Drawing on a fine tuned understanding of literary technique the book presents a revisionist view of Old English literature partly by reclaiming often neglected texts and partly by uncovering ironies and embarrassments within well established works including Beowulf Most surprisingly Jonathan Wilcox engages the large body of didactic literature pinpointing humour in two anonymous homilies along with extensive use in saints lives Each chapter ends by revealing a different audience that would have shared in the laughter Wilcox suggests that the humour of Old English literature has been scantily covered in past scholarship because modern readers expect a dour and serious corpus Humour in Old English Literature aims to break that cycle by highlighting works and moments that are as entertaining now as they were then

Apocryphal Texts and Traditions in Anglo-Saxon England Kathryn Powell,D. G. Representations of the Natural World in Old English Poetry Jennifer Neville, 1999-03-13 This book examines descriptions of the natural world in a wide range of Old English poetry Jennifer Neville describes the physical conditions experienced by the Anglo Saxons the animals diseases landscapes seas and weather with which they had to contend She argues that poetic descriptions of these elements were not a reflection of the existing physical conditions but a literary device used by Anglo Saxons to define more important issues the state of humanity the creation and maintenance of society the power of individuals the relationship between God

and creation and the power of writing to control information Examples of contemporary literature in other languages are used to provide a sense of Old English poetry's particular approach which incorporated elements from Germanic Christian and classical sources The result of this approach was not a consistent cosmological scheme but a rather contradictory vision which reveals much about how the Anglo Saxons viewed themselves

Old English Literature in Its Manuscript Context Joyce Tally Lionarons, 2004 In *Old English Literature in its Manuscript Context* editor Joyce Tally Lionarons has developed a multifaceted collection examining the issues facing the textual transmission of Anglo Saxon writings Eight established scholars consider the ideas of textual identity authorship and translation and editorial standards and obligations This work also features a scholarly exchange of ideas and photographs of the original Anglo Saxon manuscripts making this essential reading for anyone interested in the history of Old English literature The essays published in this text were originally composed at an NEH summer seminar conducted by Paul Szarmach and Timothy Graham at the Parker Library of Corpus Christi College Cambridge in 1997

A History of Old English Literature Michael Alexander, 2002-01-14 Alexander's *A History of Old English Literature* is an outstanding introduction to a difficult period of literary history It provides a simple historical and cultural context for the study of the Anglo Saxons and offers a history illustrated by many passages in translation of the whole of the literature that survives While it contains solid insightful and sensible criticism of individual literary works its overall historical organization suggests that Old English literature was created in a cultural context that changed from one century to another Although its intentions are scholarly this history of Old English literature is also an introduction assuming little knowledge of this period or its surviving products and none of its language This edition has been revised and rewritten throughout and offers a new preface as well as an updated bibliography

Reading the Runes in Old English and Old Norse Poetry Thomas Birkett, 2017-03-27 *Reading the Runes in Old English and Old Norse Poetry* is the first book length study to compare responses to runic heritage in the literature of Anglo Saxon England and medieval Iceland The Anglo Saxon runic script had already become the preserve of antiquarians at the time the majority of Old English poetry was written down and the Icelanders recording the mythology associated with the script were at some remove from the centres of runic practice in medieval Scandinavia Both literary cultures thus inherited knowledge of the runic system and the traditions associated with it but viewed this literate past from the vantage point of a developed manuscript culture There has as yet been no comprehensive study of poetic responses to this scriptural heritage which include episodes in such canonical texts as *Beowulf* the Old English riddles and the poems of the Poetic Edda By analysing the inflection of the script through shared literary traditions this study enhances our understanding of the burgeoning of literary self awareness in early medieval vernacular poetry and the construction of cultural memory and furthers our understanding of the relationship between Anglo Saxon and Norse textual cultures The introduction sets out in detail the rationale for examining runes in poetry as a literary motif and surveys the relevant critical debates The body of the volume is comprised of five linked case

studies of runes in poetry viewing these representations through the paradigm of scriptural reconstruction and the validation of contemporary literary historical and religious sensibilities **The Old English Metrical Calendar (Menologium)**

Early Germanic Literature and Culture Brian Murdoch, Malcolm Kevin Read, 2004 A collection of fresh essays examining the wide scope and significance of early Germanic culture and literature The first volume of this set views the development of writing in German with respect to broad aspects of the early Germanic past drawing on a range of disciplines including archaeology anthropology and philology in addition to literary history The first part considers the whole concept of Germanic antiquity and the way in which it has been approached examines classical writings about Germanic origins and the earliest Germanic tribes and looks at the two great influences on the early Germanic world the confrontation with the Roman Empire and the displacement of Germanic religion by Christianity A chapter on orality the earliest stage of all literature provides a bridge to the earliest Germanic writings The second part of the book is devoted to written Germanic rather than German materials with a series of chapters looking first at the Runic inscriptions then at Gothic the first Germanic language to find its way onto parchment in Ulfilas's Bible translation The topic turns finally to what we now understand as literature with general surveys of the three great areas of early Germanic literature Old Norse Old English and Old High and Low German A final chapter is devoted to the Old Saxon Heliand Contributors T M Andersson Heinrich Beck Graeme Dunphy Klaus Dörmann G Ronald Murphy Adrian Murdoch Brian Murdoch Rudolf Simek Herwig Wolfram Brian Murdoch and Malcolm Read both teach in the German Department of the University of Stirling in Scotland

Finding the Right Words Claudia Di Sciaccia, 2008-09-18 Isidore of Seville circa 570-636 was the author of the *Etymologiae* the most celebrated and widely circulated encyclopaedia of the western Middle Ages In addition Isidore's *Synonyma* were very successful and became one of the classics of medieval spirituality Indeed it was the *Synonyma* that were to define the so-called Isidorian style a rhymed rhythmic prose that proved influential throughout the Middle Ages *Finding the Right Words* is the first book-length study to deal with the transmission and reception of works by Isidore of Seville in Anglo-Saxon England with a particular focus on the *Synonyma* Beginning with a general survey of Isidore's life and activity as a bishop in early seventh-century Visigothic Spain Claudia Di Sciaccia offers a comprehensive introduction to the *Synonyma* drawing special attention to their distinctive style She goes on to discuss the transmission of the text to early medieval England and its vernacularisation that is its translations and adaptations in Old English prose and verse The case for the particular receptiveness of the *Synonyma* in Anglo-Saxon England is strongly supported by both a close reading of primary sources and an extensive selection of secondary literature This rigorous well-documented volume demonstrates the significance of the *Synonyma* to our understanding of the literary pretensions and pedagogical practices of Anglo-Saxon England and offers new
