treatment for incontinence and ED with forms of sex therapy biofeedback and PDE 5 inhibitors Regrettably many aging adults and their care providers remain unaware of their increased risk factors for STDs including HIV infection via lack of knowledge changes in the vaginal lining and typical declines in immune function Estimates suggest that by the year 2020 more than half of all individuals living with HIV will be over the age of 50 Although some high quality professional books are available for clinicians they tend to be disjointed research bibliographies edited volumes on a narrowly focused aspect of elderly sexuality or texts that are more than 10 years old With the extent of new information available regarding sexuality and aging an up to date empirically based text is necessary
