**Quantification** Lisa Matthewson,2008 This volume presents articles by formal linguists on quantification in relatively understudied languages The ten contributions provide analysis of quantificational phenomena in languages from nine different families Eskimo Aleut Algonquian Na Dene Austronesian Basque Quechua Otomanguean Bantu and Chadic Approximately half of the papers present systematic overviews of quantificational phenomena in the respective languages the remainder of the papers present theoretical analyses of specific quantificational constructions The cross linguistic focus of

the constituents contained in them They are special as they exhibit a rather uncommon syntactic form to achieve the separation of the prominent part either focal or topical from the background of the clause Despite the long lasting interest in clefts linguists have not yet come to an agreement on many basic questions. The articles contained in this volume address these issues from new theoretical and empirical perspectives Based on data from about 50 languages from all over the world this volume presents new arguments for the proper derivation of clefts and contributes to the ongoing debate on the information structural impact of cleft structures Theoretically it combines modern syntactic theorizing with investigations at the interface between grammar and information structure Movement in Language Norvin Richards, 2001 This book is the most comprehensive integrated explanatory account yet published of the properties of question formations and their variation across languages It makes an important contribution to the current debate over whether syntax should be understood derivationally arguing that the best model of language is one in which sentences are constructed in a series of operations that precede or follow each other in time The central problem it addresses is the nature of the difference between a languages in which all wh words move overtly to a clause initial position exemplified by Bulgarian b languages in which one wh phrase moves per clause but all others remain in situ exemplified by English and c languages in which there is no overt movement at all exemplified by Japanese Professor Richards focuses on the nature of syntactic movement in order to see what this reveals about the syntactic derivation He considers the nature of interactions between movement operations and investigates the behaviour of multiple overt wh movement scrambling cliticization and object shift His general conclusions about the relationship between movement and multiple specifiers follow straightforwardly from basic principles of Shortest Move and Shortest Attract He develops a PF imposed well formedness condition on movement chains essentially a requirement that a single member of the chain be unambiguously identified as the copy to be pronounced which allows for the development of theories of anti agreement the that trace effect and the conditions on participial agreement in Romance among other phenomena He defends the claim that well formed dependencies can improve the status of ill formed dependencies created later in the derivation illustrating the explanatory power under certain structural conditions of his Principle of Minimal Compliance He uses data on the locality of wh movement to argue that the Principle of Minimal Compliance is responsible for a number of the apparent distinctions between overt and covert movement This book will interest syntacticians at graduate level and above as well as linguistic theorists concerned with the syntax semantics interface Grammaticalization as Economy Elly van Gelderen, 2004-08-31 This book provides much detail on the changes involving the grammaticalization of personal and relative pronouns topicalized nominals complementizers adverbs prepositions modals perception verbs and aspectual markers It accounts for these changes in terms of two structural economy principles Head Preference expresses that single words i e heads are used to build structures rather than full phrases and Late Merge states that waiting as late as possible to merge i e be added to the structure is preferred over

movement The book also discusses grammar external processes e g prescriptivist rules that inhibit change and innovations that replenish the grammaticalized element Most of the changes involve the extended CP and IP as elements grammaticalize clause boundaries disappear Cross linguistic differences exist as to whether the CP IP and VP are all present and split and this is formulated as the Layer Principle Changes involving the CP are typically brought about by Head Preference whereas those involving the IP and VP by Late Merge
