Royal Taste Daniëlle De Vooght, 2016-04-08 The explicit association between food and status was academically speaking first acknowledged on the food production level He who owned the land possessed the grain he who owned the mill had the flour he who owned the oven sold the bread However this conceptualization of power is dual next to the obvious demonstration of power on the production level is the social significance of food consumption Consumption of rich food in terms of quantity and quality was and is a means to show one's social status and to create or uphold power This book is concerned with the relationship between food consumption status and power Contributors address the old top of society and consider the way kings and queens emperors and dukes nobles and aristocrats wine and dined in the rapidly changing world of the late eighteenth and nineteenth centuries where the bourgeoisie and even the common people obtained political rights economic influence social importance and cultural authority The book questions the role of food consumption at courts and the significance of particular foodstuffs or ways of cooking deals with the number of guests and their place at the table and studies the way the courts under consideration influenced one another Topics include the role of sherry at the court of Queen Victoria as a means of representing middle class values the use of the truffle as a promotional gift at the Savoy court and the influence of European culture on banqueting at the Ottoman Palace Together the volume addresses issues of social networks prestige politics and diplomacy banquets and their design income and spending economic aims taste and preference cultural innovations social hierarchies material culture and many more social and cultural issues It will provide a useful entry into food history for scholars of court culture and anyone with an interest in modern cultural history

The Wedding Present Louise Purbrick, 2016-02-17 In this fascinating work Louise Purbrick offers an alternative analysis of contemporary domestic consumption She investigates the ritualized presentation of objects upon marriage and their subsequent cycles of exchange within the domestic sphere Focusing on gift giving in Britain from 1945 to the present comparative context is provided by material from North America and Europe Presenting new material on the enactment of

Anglo-Scottish Literature, 1603-1832 Rivka Swenson, 2015-12-30 John Locke asked since all things that exist are merely particulars how come we by general terms Essential Scots and the Idea of Unionism in Anglo Scottish Literature 1603 1832 tells a story about aesthetics and politics that looks back to the 1603 Union of Crowns and James VI I s emigration from Edinburgh to London Considering the emergence of British unionism alongside the literary rise of both description and the individual Rivka Swenson builds on extant scholarship with original close readings that illuminate the inheritances of 1603 a date of considerable but untraced importance in Anglo Scottish literary and cultural history whose legacies are still being negotiated today The 1603 Union of Crowns spurred interest in exploring the aesthetic politics of unionism in relation to an alleged Scottish essence that could be manipulated to resist or support Britishness even as the king s emigration generated a legacy of gendered representations of traveling Scots and Scotlands left behind Discussing writers such as Bacon Defoe Smollett Johnson Macpherson Ferrier and Scott along with lesser known or forgotten popular authors and ballads

transparencies newspapers joke books cant dictionaries political speeches histories travel narratives engravings material artifacts such as medals and snuffboxes Essential Scots describes the years 1603 to 1832 as a crucial period in British history Paradoxically the political and cultural exploration of ideas about unionism in relation to a supposed essential Scottishness participated in the increasing prominence of both description and the individual in nineteenth century Scottish literature Swenson persuasively concludes that essential Scottishness as both identity and symbolism was refigured to mediate a national synthesis between the emergent individual and the nascent British nation as well as the naturalized even de politicized literary synthesis of particulars within putatively analogous narrative wholes *Slaves and Warriors in Medieval Britain and Ireland* David R. Newell, 2014-03-15 Drawing from 167 examples of decorative needlework primarily samplers and quilts from 114 collections across the United States made by individual women aged forty years and over between 1820 and 1860 this exquisitely illustrated book explores how women experienced social and cultural change in antebellum America The book is filled with individual examples stories and over eighty fine color photographs that illuminate the role that samplers and needlework played in the culture of the time For example in October 1852 Amy Fiske 1785 1859 of Sturbridge Massachusetts stitched a sampler But she was not a schoolgirl making a sampler to learn her letters Instead as she explained The above is what I have taken from my sampler that I wrought when I was nine years old It was w rough t on fine cloth and it tattered to pieces My age at this time is 66 years Situated at the intersection of women s history material culture study and the history of aging this book brings together objects diaries letters portraits and prescriptive literature to consider how middle class American women experienced the aging process Chapters explore the physical and mental effects of old age on antebellum women and their needlework technological developments related to needlework during the antebellum period and the tensions that arose from the increased mechanization of textile production and how gift needlework functioned among friends and family members Far from being solely decorative ornaments or functional household textiles these samplers and quilts served their own ends They offered aging women a means of coping of sharing and of expressing themselves These threads of time provide a valuable and revealing source for the lives of mature antebellum women Publication of this book was made possible in part through generous funding from the Coby Foundation Ltd and from the Quilters Guild of Dallas Helena Hibbs Endowment Fund
