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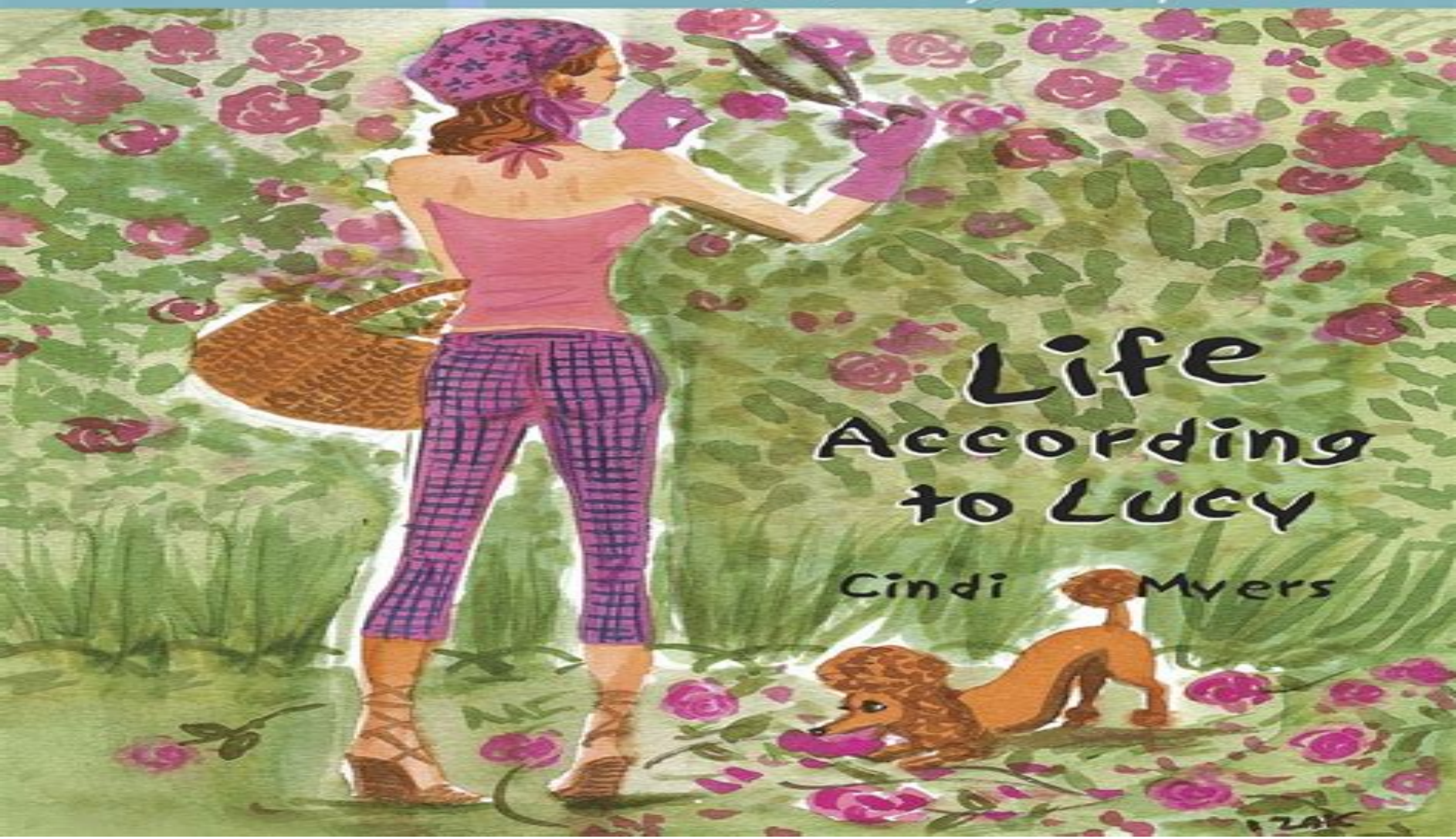

*The Right to Home* Tasoulla Hadjiyanni, 2019-09-05 This book explores how the design characteristics of homes can support or suppress individuals' attempts to create meaning in their lives which in turn impacts well being and delineates the production of health income and educational disparities within homes and communities According to the author the physical realities of living space such as how kitchen layouts restrict cooking and the size of social areas limits gatherings with friends or how dining tables can shape aspirations have a salient connection to the beliefs culture and happiness of the individuals in the space The book's purpose is to examine the human capacity to create meaning and to rally home mediators scholars educators design practitioners policy makers and advocates to work toward Culturally Enriched Communities in which everyone can thrive The volume includes stories from Hmong Somali Mexican Ojibwe and African American individuals living in Minnesota to show how space intersects with race gender citizenship ability religion and ethnicity positing that social inequalities are partially spatially constructed and are therefore malleable

*Bad Logic* Daniel Wright, 2018-04-16 How did the Victorians think about love and desire Reader I married him Jane Eyre famously says of her beloved Mr Rochester near the end of Charlotte Brontë's novel But why does she do it we might logically ask after all he's put her through The Victorian realist novel privileges the marriage plot in which love and desire are represented as formative social experiences Yet how novelists depict their characters reasoning about that erotic desire making something intelligible and ethically meaningful out of the aspect of interior life that would seem most essentially embodied singular and nonlinguistic remains a difficult question In *Bad Logic* Daniel Wright addresses this paradox investigating how the Victorian novel represented reasoning about desire without diluting its intensity or making it mechanical Connecting problems of sexuality to questions of logic and language Wright posits that forms of reasoning that seem fuzzy opaque difficult or simply bad can function as surprisingly rich mechanisms for speaking and thinking about erotic desire These forms of bad logic surrounding sexuality ought not be read as mistakes fallacies or symptoms of sexual repression Wright asserts but rather as useful forms through which novelists illustrate the complexities of erotic desire Offering close readings of canonical writers Charlotte Brontë Anthony Trollope George Eliot and Henry James *Bad Logic* contextualizes their work within the historical development of the philosophy of language and the theory of sexuality This book will interest a range of scholars working in Victorian literature gender and sexuality studies and interdisciplinary approaches to literature and philosophy

book's authors challenge this standard view. This is the first volume to connect philosophical discussions on the harm of death with discussions on population health, adjusting the ways in which death is evaluated. Changing these evaluations has consequences for how we prioritize different health programs that affect individuals at different ages as well as how we understand inequality in health.

*Ambiguity in Charlotte Brontë's Villette* Olga Springer, 2020-02-17 Charlotte Brontë's final novel Villette 1853 is associated with ambiguity because of its open ending Does M Paul return to narrator protagonist Lucy Snowe or is he killed in a storm raging on the Atlantic Taking its famous ending as a starting point this study explores Villette as a text in which ambiguity is all pervasive in various ways Among these is the narrator's ambivalent attitude toward herself and others epitomised in her stylistic idiosyncrasies The links between ambiguity and doubt are explored through an analysis of Lucy's signature phrase I know not expressive of her existential doubts and questioning attitude toward the world The analysis moreover focuses on the motif of the oracle as a traditionally ambiguous utterance and explores its relevance in the context of the generic tradition of Villette as a fictional autobiography Another focus is the interplay of figurative and literal levels of meaning in the allegorical episodes creating ambiguity

**Secrecy and Disclosure in Victorian Fiction** Leila Silvana May, 2016-07-15 Why were the Victorians more fascinated with secrecy than people of other periods What is the function of secrets in Victorian fiction and in the society depicted how does it differ from that of other periods and how did readers of Victorian fiction respond to the secrecy they encountered These are some of the questions Leila May poses in her study of the dynamics of secrecy and disclosure in fiction from Queen Victoria's coronation to the century's end May argues that the works of writers such as Charlotte Brontë William Makepeace Thackeray Mary Elizabeth Braddon Edward Bulwer Lytton and Arthur Conan Doyle reflect a distinctly Victorian obsession with the veiling and unveiling of information She argues that there are two opposing vectors in Victorian culture concerning secrecy and subjectivity one presupposing a form of radical Cartesian selfhood always remaining a secret to other selves and another showing that nothing can be hidden from the trained eye May calls the relation between these clashing tendencies the dialectics of secrecy and disclosure May's theories of secrecy and disclosure are informed by the work of twentieth century social scientists She emphasizes Georg Simmel's thesis that sociality and subjectivity are impossible without secrecy and Erving Goffman's claim that sociality can be understood in terms of performativity the presentation of the self in everyday life and his revelation that performance always involves disguise hence secrecy May's study offers convincing evidence that secrecy and duplicity in contrast to the Victorian period's emphasis on honesty and earnestness emerged in response to the social pressures of class gender

monarchy and empire and were key factors in producing both the subjectivity and the sociality that we now recognize as Victorian     *Errancies of Desire* Vartan P.
