Installation and the Moving Image Catherine Elwes, 2015-05-12 Film and video create an illusory world a reality elsewhere and a material presence that both dramatizes and demystifies the magic trick of moving pictures Beginning in the 1960s artists have explored filmic and televisual phenomena in the controlled environments of galleries and museums drawing on multiple antecedents in cinema television and the visual arts This volume traces the lineage of moving image installation through architecture painting sculpture performance expanded cinema film history and countercultural film and video from the 1960s 1970s and 1980s Sound is given due attention along with the shift from analogue to digital issues of spectatorship and the insights of cognitive science Woven into this genealogy is a discussion of the procedural political

theoretical and ideological positions espoused by artists from the mid twentieth century to the present Historical constructs such as Peter Gidal's structural materialism Maya Deren's notion of vertical and horizontal time and identity politics are reconsidered in a contemporary context and intersect with more recent thinking on representation subjectivity and installation art The book is written by a critic curator and practitioner who was a pioneer of British video and feminist art politics in the late 1970s Elwes writes engagingly of her encounters with works by Anthony McCall Gillian Wearing David Hall and Janet Cardiff and her narrative is informed by exchanges with other practitioners While the book addresses the key formal theoretical and historical parameters of moving image installation it ends with a question What's in it for the artist

of his cinema including music dance and the clothes that accompany these now typically Ozonian episodes Schilt contextualizes Ozon's filmmaking within the larger fields of French filmmaking and international queer cinema and he discusses several major themes running through Ozon's work including obsessions with inadequate fathers various types of mourning and a recurring taste for the foreign The volume also includes an insightful interview with the director

Christophe Honoré David A. Gerstner, Julien Nahmias, 2015-12-01 Studies Honor as an auteur who intervenes in French filmmaking practices and culture with a queer camera style French filmmaker Christophe Honor challenges audiences with complex cinematic form intricate narrative structures and aesthetically dynamic filmmaking But the limited release of his films outside of Europe has left him largely unknown to U.S. audiences In *Christophe Honoré: A Critical Introduction* authors David A. La Haine Ginette Vincendeau, 2005-10-04 *La Haine* is a cult classic with cinema audiences recently re-released and available on dvd Ginette Vincendeau is top authority internationally on French cinema who writes eg *Sight and Sound* and broadcasts eg *Front Row* Radio 4 on it regularly It is hugely enjoyable exciting book written with great panache and accessibility Released in 1995 *La Haine* is the black and white chronicle of 24 hours in the life of a mixed race young male trio from a run down Parisian suburb The work of a then unknown young team it became hugely and unexpectedly successful launching director Mathieu Kassovitz and lead player Vincent Cassel to stardom Vincendeau provides a thorough understanding of the context of the film's making both in terms of the film industry and of French society of the film's narrative tension stylistic sophistication and ideological ambiguity and of its extraordinary success nationally and internationally She thus explains why out of so many films about disaffected youth *La Haine* is the one that has caught the international imagination

Alphaville Chris Darke, 2005 It uses new interviews with Godard's main collaborators on the film to reveal new aspects and explores its multiple influences on *Blade Runner* for example or *Code 46* This is the first ever full appraisal of Godard's highly influential classic of sci fi noir Chris Darke writes about how working without sets special effects or even a script Godard made a dystopian vision of a technocratic future city He explores the film's unique combination of genres and styles its remarkable creation the secret agent Lemmy Caution and uses his new interviews with the director's collaborators to chronicle the film's production He also relates *Alphaville* to Godard's later work setting it in the context of his wider career and of its influence on other filmmakers and artists
