Gauthier, 2022-04-26 Should we humanize the world's most inhumane leaders Adolf Hitler Joseph Stalin Benito Mussolini Mao Zedong Kim Il Sung Vladimir Lenin These cruel dictators wrote their names on the pages of history in the blood of countless innocent victims Yet they themselves were once young people searching for their place in the world dealing with challenges many of us face parental authority education romance loss and doing so in ways that might be uncomfortably familiar Historian Brandon K Gauthier has created a fascinating work epic yet intimate well researched but immensely readable clear eyed and empathetic looking at the lives of these six dictators with a focus on their youths We watch Lenin's older brother executed at the hands of the Tsar's police an event that helped radicalize this overachieving high schooler We observe Stalin grappling with the death of his young beautiful wife We see Hitler's mother mourning the loss of three young children and determined that her first son to survive infancy would find his place in the world The purpose isn't to excuse or simply explain these horrible men but rather to treat them with the empathy they themselves too often lacked We may prefer to hold such lives at arm's length so as to demonize them at will but this book reminds us that these monstrous rulers were also human beings and perhaps more relatable than we'd like *Translations on International Communist Developments*

 views about the nature and value of communism triumphed over more moderate ones she traces the transfer of the left's
 leadership from one generation to the next She describes how supporters of the People's Front were discredited by the time
 of the Nazi Soviet Pact and how this opened the way for a new generation of leaders better known as the New York
 intellectuals In this shift Kutulas identifies the beginnings of the liberal anti communism that would follow World War II A

 Folkways in Soviet Russia* offers original perspectives on the politics of everyday life in the Soviet Union by closely examining
 the coping mechanisms individuals and leaders alike developed as they grappled with the political social and intellectual
 challenges the system presented before and after World War II As Gabor T Rittersporn shows the little tactics people
 employed in their daily lives not only helped them endure the rigors of life during the Stalin and post Stalin periods but also
 strongly influenced the system's development into the Gorbachev and post Soviet eras For Rittersporn citizens conscious and
 unreflected actions at all levels of society defined a distinct Soviet universe Terror faith disillusionment evasion folk customs
 revolt and confusion about regime goals and the individual's relation to them were all integral to the development of that
 universe and the culture it engendered Through a meticulous reading of primary documents and materials uncovered in

numerous archives located in Russia and Germany Rittersporn identifies three related responses anguish anger and folkways to the pressures people in all walks of life encountered and shows how these responses in turn altered the way the system operated Rittersporn finds that the leadership generated widespread anguish by its inability to understand and correct the reasons for the system's persistent political and economic dysfunctions Rather than locate the sources of these problems in their own presuppositions and administrative methods leaders attributed them to omnipresent conspiracy and wrecking which they tried to extirpate through terror He shows how the unrelenting pursuit of enemies exacerbated systemic failures and contributed to administrative breakdowns and social dissatisfaction Anger resulted as the populace reacted to the notable gap between the promise of a self governing egalitarian society and the actual experience of daily existence under the heavy hand of the party state Those who had interiorized systemic values demanded a return to what they took for the original Bolshevik project while others sought an outlet for their frustrations in destructive or self destructive behavior In reaction to the system's pressure citizens instinctively developed strategies of noncompliance and accommodation A detailed examination of these folkways enables Rittersporn to identify and describe the mechanisms and spaces intuitively created by officials and ordinary citizens to evade the regime's dictates or to find a modus vivendi with them Citizens and officials alike employed folkways to facilitate work avoid tasks advance careers augment their incomes display loyalty enjoy life's pleasures and simply to survive Through his research Rittersporn uncovers a fascinating world consisting of peasant stratagems and subterfuges underground financial institutions falsified Supreme Court documents and associations devoted to peculiar sexual practices As Rittersporn shows popular and elite responses and tactics deepened the regime's ineffectiveness and set its modernization project off down unintended paths Trapped in a web of behavioral patterns and social representations that eluded the understanding of both conservatives and reformers the Soviet system entered a cycle of self defeat where leaders and led exercised less and less control over the course of events In the end a new system emerged that neither the establishment nor the rest of society could foresee

The Assassination of Europe, 1918-1942 Howard M.

from three Nazi prison camps Soviet soldier Azamat Altay fled to the West and was charged as a traitor in his homeland of Kyrgyzstan in Soviet Central Asia Chingiz Aitmatov became a hero of Kyrgyzstan propelled by family loss to write novels about the everyday lives of his fellow citizens While both came from small villages in the beautiful mountainous countryside they found themselves caught on opposite sides of the Cold War struggle between world superpowers Altay became the voice of democracy on Radio Liberty broadcasting back into his shuttered homeland while Aitmatov rose through the ranks of Soviet society a quiet rebel whose prose masked ugly truths about Soviet communism Yet just as they seemed to be pulled apart by the divisions of the Cold War they found their lives intersecting in compelling ways joined by a common mission to save their people The stories of Chingiz Aitmatov and Azamat Altay are best told together a herculean task which Jeffrey B Lilley's *Have The Mountains Fallen Two Journeys of Loss and Redemption in the Cold War* manages deftly Their story because it is in essence a single story is that of Kyrgyzstan itself replete with tragedy and sacrifice hope and triumph The Diplomat A Cold War story that gives hope Richard G Lugar United States Senator Ret *Writing the Siege of Leningrad* Cynthia Simmons, Nina M. Perlina, 2012-01-12 Silver Winner ForeWord Magazine Book of the Year History From September 1941 until January 1944 Leningrad suffered under one of the worst sieges in the history of warfare At least one million civilians died many during the terribly cold first winter Bearing the brunt of this hardship and keeping the city alive through their daily toil and sacrifice were the women of Leningrad Yet their perspective on life during the siege has been little examined Cynthia Simmons and Nina Perlina have searched archival holdings for letters and diaries written during the siege conducted interviews with survivors and collected poetry fiction and retrospective memoirs written by the *blokadnitsy* women survivors to present a truer picture of the city under siege In simple direct even heartbreaking language these documents tell of lost husbands mothers children meager rations often supplemented with sawdust and other inedible additives crime cruelty and even cannibalism They also relate unexpected acts of kindness and generosity attempts to maintain cultural life through musical and dramatic performances and provide insight into a group of ordinary women reaching beyond differences in socioeconomic class ethnicity and profession in order to survive in extraordinary times

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
