

Emmanuel Lévinas, Jill Robbins, 2001 In the twenty interviews collected in this volume seventeen of which appear in English for the first time Levinas sets forth the central features of his ethical philosophy and discusses biographical matters not available elsewhere Is It Righteous to Be? Jill Robbins, 2022 Recent debates within Continental philosophy have decisively renewed the question of the ethical with the French philosopher Emmanuel Levinas 1905 1995 as its center Coming from yet in contestation with the phenomenological traditions of Husserl and Heidegger Levinas defines ethics as an originary response to the face of the other For him language is an exception to a habitual economy that represses alterity and maintains the asymmetry and distance constitutive of the nontotalizing relation to the other Ethics occurs in the interlocutionary relation to the other and interpellation a kind of interruption by speaking is the essential feature of ethical language Between 1982 and 1992 Levinas gave numerous interviews closing a distinguished sixty year career Of the twenty interviews collected in this volume seventeen appear in English for the first time In the interviews Levinas sets forth the central features of his ethical philosophy previously enunciated in Totality and Infinity 1961 in a language that bridges to the idiom of his later work He underlines his dedication to the phenomenological search for the concrete and the nonformal signification of alterity He also elaborates issues that do not receive extensive treatment in his formal philosophical works including the question of prephilosophical experiences and the ethical signification of money justice and the State The informality of the interviews prompts Levinas to address matters about which he is reticent in his published works notably the relation of his ethical philosophy to theological questions the intrication of the Hebrew Bible in Greek philosophy his substantial corpus of nonphilosophical or confessional writings on the Talmud and recollections of his extraordinary talmudic teacher Shoshani The centerpiece of the volume is a previously untranslated 1986 interview with Fran ois Poiri Containing Levinas s sole extended discussion of biographical matters with an interviewer this text helps to situate Levinas in his contemporary intellectual world and to clarify his place in French thought An Existential **Phenomenology of Addiction** Anna Westin, 2020-02-20 Existential phenomenology can be a particularly helpful philosophical method for understanding human experience Starting from the perspective of the subject it can clarify and problematize subtle everyday relations enabling greater insight into difficult situations. Used by contemporary philosophers as a way of understanding the embodied experience of illness this method has been helpful for understanding physical illness in the medical humanities offering a fruitful way of reading the subjectivity of mental states An Existential Phenomenology of Addiction examines how the experience of addiction engages both mental and physical phenomena within the existence of a particular human life using the philosophy of Emmanuel L vinas and S ren Kierkegaard The book maps out an existential phenomenology of subject in relation Both L vinas and Kierkegaard use decidedly psychological and theological language to situate their philosophy discussing the subject through concepts of love otherness responsibility and hope while played out in

a situation of anxiety suffering desire and revelation Combining existential phenomenological discourse with contemporary addiction discourse Westin argues that the concept of subject as addict as found in the Twelve Steps Program and disease models of addiction ought to be replaced with the free and relational identity of subject as addicted Annabel Herzog, 2020-01-24 A compelling account of politics and social philosophy in Levinas s Talmudic commentaries Emmanuel Levinas 1906 1995 was a French philosopher known for his radical ethics and for his contribution to Jewish thought in his commentaries on Talmudic sources In Levinas s Politics Annabel Herzog confronts a major difficulty in Levinas s philosophy the relationship between ethics and politics Levinas s ethics describes the encounter with the other that is with any other human being For Levinas the face to face encounter is a relationship in which the ego is commanded by a transcendent and unquestionable order to take responsibility for the other person Politics on the other hand presupposes at least three people the ego the other and any third party Among three people nothing can be transcendent on the contrary everything must be negotiated Against the conventional view of Levinas's conception of the political as the interruption and collapse of the ethical Herzog argues that in the Talmudic readings Levinas constructed politics positively She shows that Levinas s Talmudic readings embody a pragmatism that complements revises and challenges the extreme ethical analyses he offers in his phenomenological works Totality and Infinity Otherwise than Being and Of God Who Comes to Mind Her analysis illuminates Levinas s explanations of the relationship between ethics and politics ethics is the foundation of justice justice contains a necessary violence that must be moderated by mercy and justice general laws and national aspirations must be linked in an attempt to improve universality itself The Existential Philosophy of Etty Hillesum Meins G.
